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## **Hood County COVID-19 Interim Update - 8-25-2020, 1 pm**

831 total COVID-19 cases have been detected in Hood County residents since mid-March (53 new cases reported since the 8-21 report). We currently have 58 active cases hospitalized or under isolation (decreased from 75 on 8-21), and a 10.1% positive test rate overall, with a 5.9% positive test rate since last week.

We have 16 COVID positive deaths reported for Hood County residents, no new deaths reported this week, all over the age of 60. 13/16 (81%) of the deaths were COVID-related (death directly complicated or caused by COVID-19 related illness). 14/16 (88%) were 60 years or older.

49 local COVID-19 PCR nasal swab tests (looking for active COVID-19 infection) are waiting for laboratory results.

Texas Health Trace website has now been in effect for about three months, and Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) is confirming these self-reports and adding to county numbers across the state. There are differences between local county reports and DSHS website numbers because of delays in processing local cases to DSHS and their need to ultimately deconflict multiple reporting sources across the state.

Fifteen of the 58 active cases today are under 20 years old (26% of the total active cases right now), and are in isolation away from school and work (ten more added since Friday). Across the county, any student with possible COVID-19 symptoms is being tested and sent home, rather than being allowed to go to school.

Thirty of the active cases today are in adults aged 20-59 (52% of active cases), and 11 are in elderly adults aged 60 and older (19%).

We remain in close collaboration with public school leadership across the county; they are all in compliance with Texas Educational Agency Public Health guidance for reopening. We also continue to coordinate with private and charter schools in Hood County. **COVID-19 in Hood County - By the Numbers:**

- 831 total cases reported in Hood County residents from all sources
- 757 have recovered and were released from isolation, per CDC/DSHS protocols
- 58 active cases remain isolated (positive COVID-19 PCR nasal swab test reported within last 10 days, plus a few who remain symptomatic longer)
- 5 current reported hospitalizations, all other active cases have been directed to self-isolate at home
- 16 total COVID-positive deaths (13 COVID-related, three additional were COVID-positive at time of death)
- 768 positive PCR nasal swab tests reported (some repeated, some positive for residents of other counties)
- 10.1% positive PCR nasal swab test rate since March 2020
- 5.9% positive PCR nasal swab test rate since the last report on 8-21
- 121 cases detected in residents of surrounding counties, reported to DSHS and their county health authorities

- 78 are 10-19 years old (9%)
  - 89 are under age 20 (10%)
- 135 are 20-29 years old (16%)

- 124 are 40-49 years old (15%)
- 123 are 50-59 years old (15%)
  - 247 are ages 40-59 (30%)
- 95 are 60-69 years old (12%)
- 69 are 70-79 years old (8%)
- 59 are 80-89 years old (7%)
- 19 are 90-99 years old (2%)
- 2 are more than 100 years old (less than 1%)
  - 244 are aged 60 or older (30%)

**Hood County COVID-19 Confirmed Cases by Reported Contact Type (Out of 826 Cases as of 8-25)**

- 6 contracted by Travel (less than 1%)
- 115 contracted from Family (14%)
- 78 contracted at Work (9%)
- 474 contracted from Community/Unknown Source (57%)
- 153 contract type was unreported (18%)

**Hood County remains at SUBSTANTIAL risk of COVID-19 transmission.**

**Texas Workforce Commission and DSHS recommendations for repeat COVID testing (7-23-2020):**

**COVID-19 testing is NOT required or recommended for most for people to return to work or regular activities following mild COVID-19 illness.**

Criteria include at least ten days since the onset of symptoms consistent with coronavirus illness (or date of positive test if no symptoms), complete RESOLUTION of those symptoms, and more than 24 hours fever-free without the use of fever reducing medication.
